suggested the boolean circuit that computes a boolean function However an important question remains What is the nature of computation In 1957 John von Neumann vN58 wrote in his notes for the Silliman Lectures concerning the nature of computation and the human brain that logics and statistics should be primarily although not exclusively viewed as the basic tools of information theory Also that body of experience which has grown up around the planning evaluating and coding of complicated logical and mathematical automata will be the focus of much of this information theory.
